Ernest's second show treated us to the splendid colours of the Autumn and once again, early morning light added immensely to the quality of many images.







SEMINAR by Andy Heics Marketing Your Images Review by Kas Stone

In his seminar, *Marketing Your Images*, Andy presented a wealth of practical information and advice for anyone interested in turning their passion for photography into a photographic business – including the excellent advice that it *is* possible to balance these two approaches and achieve both your artistic *and* your financial objectives in the process!

Andy's seminar included information about the types of photographic images that are in demand and what styles and content are most popular; what kinds of publications and organizations are typically in the market for photographs; how to approach prospective buyers and how best to present your images to them; how to follow up effectively with license agreements; how to determine appropriate payment for your work; and how to protect your images from misuse and theft.

He passed along lots of useful tips based on his own years of professional experience, for instance: be sure to put your name and copyright on any sample digital images you send out, and include a sheet of thumbnail prints; don't be afraid to barter your photographic services if it helps to get your foot in the door; forget your beloved scenics and concentrate on "lifestyle" themes; pay attention to the fine print in a license agreement so that you don't lose the rights to your images (at least not without appropriate payment!); and "think outside the box" in order to carve a unique niche for yourself in a highly competitive business.

To conclude his seminar Andy presented a collection of "good" and "bad" images and used them to illustrate some of the most important advice of all – how to focus your energy in the field and produce an image that is technically competent, compositionally sound, artistically imaginative, and oh yes, saleable too! Whew!

For anyone interested in marketing their photographs the evening was packed with instruction and entertainment. We are grateful to Andy for taking the time to prepare such a comprehensive presentation and for sharing his experiences, both positive and negative, with those of us who are just starting out. It makes me realize what a lot I have yet to learn, both about the art and about the business of photography!

In addition to Kas's review above, *Judy Griffin* sent the following e-mail to Andy:

I wanted to thank you for giving such an in-depth presentation regarding marketing of our images.

You certainly covered a variety of issues that one needs to be aware of in considering the how, where, when, and why of doing something like this. You gave many types of potential places/situations to sell our images and good advice on making a successful approach, i.e. finding the right niche, portfolio of best work, CD & thumbnails for fast viewing, not doing cold calls. Plus you talked about the realities of marketing, and the downsides as it is not an easy thing to accomplish.

I am sure many of the members have considered attempting to market their work, or are in the process of this, and your presentation will be very helpful to give us better ideas and insight to sell our images.

SPECIAL COMPETITION 2007/2008

In keeping with the club's 50th anniversary, the topic of the Special Competition is **"aged gracefully"**.

Examples could include:

- antiques, i.e., furniture, farm equipment, spinning wheel, butter churn, musical instruments, pottery
- lined, wrinkled faces or hands
- weathered boats, windows, doors, staircases

- stately or big, old tree
- moss on gravestones
- grey/white muzzles of old animals

- rotting fruit, vegetables
- ragged clothing
- shoes with holes
- anything with mold or other type of decay

CAMERA BATTERIES By Brian Miller

Steve Maxwell at the Toronto Star noted in his March 31, 2007 column on page K4 that an independent manufacturer of good quality batteries for cordless devices, like cameras, is a Canadian company called Battery Buyer (1-800-730-8658, <u>www.batterybuyer.ca</u>).

This is good news, because it appears that the camera manufacturers' approach is to price competitively on their camera models, and then "clean up" afterwards on parts, especially batteries.

Steve reports that Battery Buyer "charge reasonable prices, maintain an excellent retail website, offer economical shipping... ...and their batteries are often better than what came from the manufacturer originally." He also mentions a little known feature of all rechargeable batteries, the milli-Ampere hour (mAh) specification. You can read more about this in an expanded version of Brian's article on our Web site.

Testing batteries:

If you need to test a battery, a desirable battery test is to place the battery "under load", such as in the camera, if it has a battery test feature. If your camera doesn't have a battery test feature, you can use a dedicated battery tester, or a small voltage meter, which can go in your camera bag. Some manufacturers of cheap rechargeable batteries, who don't understand proper battery design, may cut corners by omitting safety circuitry in their batteries. This safety circuitry is typically used to prevent over heating and over voltage. If this safety circuitry is omitted, your gear may be damaged and so may you. Either avoid really cheap or unknown quality camera batteries, or at least ask questions about their specifications to become informed.

Recycling batteries:

The city of Toronto considers all used batteries to be household hazardous waste. There are different ways to recycle used batteries. Used nickel-cadmium batteries are accepted for recycling at some electronic stores, like the Source. All used batteries are accepted at recycling centres like the city transfer stations. One example in Etobicoke is the Disco transfer station (phone 416-392-2292) open on Wednesday 10 to 6 and Saturday 7 to 12:30 PM. The Environment Days, like those at Richview Collegiate school, and others, in June of each year, are also possibilities for recycling.
