### From Judy Griffin LUMINOSITY SHARPENING (new)

Doris Woudenberg peaked my interest and curiosity when she mentioned using "luminosity sharpening" in optimising her Gold-winning image, so I thought it would be a good idea to look this technique up, as I had never heard of it before.

Scott Kelby, one of the Photoshop gurus, likes using it because he says it is quicker and easier to use, and helps avoid halos and colour artefacts (spots and noise) when you add significant sharpening to your image.

Below are the steps:

- Open your image and apply the Unsharp Mask to sharpen – This is found under Filters >Sharpening>Unsharp Mask. His direction for nice, punchy sharpening is generally - Amount: 125, Radius: 1, Threshold: 3.
- Then go to Edit menu and choose Fade Unsharp Mask. (Think of the fade slider as an "undo" because it

allows you to move the slider to decrease the percentage of sharpness, if you feel you have gone too far with your sharpening.) If you need to adjust do so, or ignore the fade slider if you are happy with the sharpness.

3) Change the Fade dialog Mode menu from Normal to Luminosity – this applies the sharpening to just the luminosity (detail) areas of your image and not colour areas thus helping to avoid halos & artefacts. Click OK to accept.

That's it.

### From Catherine Roe

PIXEL BENDER AND JULIET'S BALCONY (new)

My husband, John Anderton introduced me to Pixel Bender (must give credit where credit is due). Pixel Bender is a filter that lets you create many different versions of an image. My favourite is Oil Painting, but there are several other applications.

Here is my before and after picture of Juliet's Balcony. The original image is of an apartment building in Venice. I cropped, sharpened, straightened, and enhanced the colour in photoshop, then went to filters and chose Pixel Bender, and then chose Oil Painting. I then adjusted the levels to adjust my brush stroke, stylization, etc. to get the result I wanted. Using Pixel Bender, you can only adjust the entire picture, but as Kas pointed out to me, you might be able to use layers in Photoshop to isolate a single part of the image to be the focus of the "oil painting"





or the exception. I haven't tried this, but it would be worth trying.

Pixel Bender is a free filter that works with Photoshop CS5. You can download it at this address:

### From Tim Grey

### COLOUR CASTS

This techniques comes across as being pure magic (which is why I like to present it!), and it can be incredibly helpful when you have an extreme color cast. This can happen with digital captures when the color temperature is set to a wrong value, but usually this degree of color cast comes from things such as old color photos that have become faded or otherwise shifted in color with time.

The first step is to create a copy of the Background image layer by dragging that layer to the Create a New Layer button at the bottom of the Layers palette. Then you need to determine the color of the color cast so you can compensate for it. To do so, select Filter > Blur > Average from the menu. This will convert this layer to a single color that represents the average color of all pixels in the image. Of course, this is the problem color, so you need to determine the opposite of it so you can apply it as a compensation for the color cast. To determine that opposite color, select Image > Adjustments > Invert from the menu. This will convert the layer to the opposite of the average layer, which means it is the opposite of the color cast.

To apply this color to the underlying image, set the blend mode to Color using the dropdown at the top-left of the Layers palette. This blend mode will cause the layer to alter only the color of the underlying image, completely offsetting the strong color cast. The problem is, this will result in too strong an effect, with a color cast that is the opposite of the original, but much stronger. To tone things down and produce an image without a color cast, simply reduce the Opacity using the slider at the top-right of the Layers palette. Adjust the value until you have a perfectly neutral color in the image.

The final result will represent relatively accurate color, but it will probably appear a bit flat and possibly lacking saturation. To compensate for this you'll need to boost saturation (using a Hue/Saturation adjustment layer) and contrast (using Levels or Curves).

#### From Diane G. Brown ARE YOU READY FOR A NEW CHALLENGE?

My intention in this article is not to provide a "how to..." on creating a photo book but to present a brief overview of the possibilities offered by online companies. Who doesn't have a hard drive full of jpeg files they have intended to cull and put in an interesting format to share with friends and family. Perhaps you'll be inspired to look at this format as an alternative to producing a slideshow, making an album, using a digital photo frame or simply filling a shoebox with prints. Creating a photo book can be a very satisfying endeavor! Recently, I completed a third "chef-d'oeuvre" and enjoyed producing another original, dare I say, artistic work. Chef-d'oeuvre = masterpiece, in my own mind!

### The First Steps

If you have no experience in this area, most sites provide a comprehensive user guide or "Help" section; Picaboo even offers a short video.

Firstly you must select the size and style of book you think would best suit your project: square or rectangular, plain or thematic. An endless variety of background themes are provided to enhance your work: seasonal, sports, travel and special occasions to name a few.

Organize all the selected shots in folders and place them on your desktop to facilitate uploading them. You can have complete control of your project or you can allow the app to organize your photos and produce a book in "auto create".

### Customizing your work

Once downloaded, it is a simple matter of clicking and dragging the selected photo onto the highlighted page. Speaking from experience, "undo" is an extremely useful tool

If you decide to embrace your creative self, you are faced with numerous choices and the tools to implement them. Different companies provide some specialized tools, which you will soon discover with experimentation!

Backgrounds can be a solid colour, textured or patterned. It is possible to use one of your photos as the background and adjust its opacity. Spreading a photo across two pages can also provide a dramatic impact.

Layouts vary in design as well as the number of photos displayed on the page. These pre-designed layouts can be resized or moved about on the page. Once inserted in a "photo box " your shots can be resized and cropped. Individual pages can have different backgrounds and/or layouts.

Pages can be duplicated, inserted or deleted with the click of the mouse. Rearranging pages is just a matter of clicking and dragging.

### Text or Captions

Printed matter can be just as important as your photographs. Again, you decide font, size and colour. I found inserting information either from the web or word processor was simply a matter of storing it on a word document then copying and pasting it into a text block. Inserting a certificate proved equally easy . I scanned it and saving it as a jpeg uploaded it with my other files. Then I dragged it into a photo box and resized it.

### Covers

There are a number of styles to choose from: wrap-around, padded or leather. Depending on the style selected, you may be able to personalize the cover design with a photo as well as text and even add text to the spine.

### The Finished Product

Although apps should automatically do a spell check as well warn you of the potential low quality of a picture, when you are ready to submit your work for publication, don't forget to proof your work. Some sites will allow you to share a digital copy of your work with friends on Facebook. The price of the finished product depends on the style as well as the size and number of pages. Online discounts are frequently available. It is certainly worthwhile going to the links below and providing your e-mail address so these promotions can be sent directly to you.

You will be amazed at what you will been able to create.

EXPERIMENT! BE PATIENT! But above all HAVE FUN!
