WHAT ATTRACTED YOU TO PHOTOGRAPHY?

I enjoy capturing a moment in time and freezing it forever, thus creating something that is visually engaging. Sometimes I carefully choose my subject but other times my subjects choose me. Many times I also like to return to the same location throughout a day to explore how the sun's rays have changed the look and feel of a certain composition.

FAVOURITE SUBJECT MATTER, AND WHY?

I like the following types of photography: Landscapes, Nature and Portrait photography. I like landscapes and nature, as they never yell back and never have a deadline to meet.

Portraits are new to me. I have a model from the Shopping Channel I can use for practice and she can use the photos for her portfolio.

THOUGHTS ON MANIPULATION – IN CAMERA AND POST PROCESSING?

I do some playing within camera manipulation. I also use Photoshop, very lightly.

Also I use Levels, unsharpen mask, highlights/shadows, saturation, and border, if needed. I want my photography to remain as much a photograph as possible.

IN WHAT AREAS IN YOUR PHOTOGRAPHY WOULD YOU LIKE TO IMPROVE?

I cannot wait to get up the next day to see what I will learn next. I like to learn and find that there are a great number of members with great skills in a number of topics and ask them questions if I am having trouble with Photoshop or finding a Pub. Photoshop is where I need to improve most.



WHAT IS THE EFFECTIVE WAY YOU'VE LEARNED ABOUT PHOTOGRAPHY?

Workshops. I took two workshops with my new friend Philip Sun, one on Close-up Photography, and the other on Landscapes Photography in Franklin Island.

I like to attend workshops with hands on activities. I will also go out the next day and try new technique as soon as possible, so it is fresh in my mind.

TELL US A LITTLE ABOUT YOURSELF.

I work as a live on-air camera operator for the Shopping Channel. I am a certified Golf Teaching professional. I have been a disc jockey at weddings, parties and banquets, for ten years. (That was some time ago, my record collection has 1000, 45's and over 400 albums? What's a 45 and what are albums?)

I am married to my high school sweetheart and best friend for over 31 years, Deborah. I was union boss at the Shopping Channel, managing over 80 full-time and part-time production staff. I stepped down after seven years, to free up more time to become Chairman of Outings.

WHAT IS IN YOUR BAG?

I have two Canon D-40's camera bodies. One has 17mm to 85mm kit lens the other has 55mm to 300mm kit lens, and a Canon Prime lens 50mm. Flashes are 430 and 580 II Canon, Cokin filters, (landscape set). Manfrotto tripod with ball head.

The other important thing in my bag is a note book as I write everything down, ie: date, weather, filters and f-stops. Things that worked and did not work. I am on book four to date.

WHAT IS IT ABOUT THE ATTACHED FAVOURITE PICTURE THAT MAKES IT SPECIAL TO YOU?

BOOK REVIEW

Photographically Speaking by David duChemin

Do you find photography exciting but your photographic results often disappointing? Then David duChemin's new book is for you. *Photographically Speaking: A Deeper Look at Creating Stronger Images* (New Riders Press, 2012) is a book about visual design. Okay, you say, there are *hundreds* of books out there about visual design. Probably you have read quite a few of them already. So what makes this book worth adding to your collection? Well...


duChemin tackles the challenging subject of visual design and presents it in a refreshing, non-academic manner. His style is engaging, and he tempers his knowledge and experience with a humorous, often self-deprecating manner that makes the writing pleasantly readable. So you won't find your eyes glazing over with abstruse theories or unnecessary technical gobbledegook.

In choosing the title Photographically Speaking, duChemin cleverly sums up the book's thesis: that photography is communication, and that a photographer must use "visual language" in the same way that an author uses written language to express his message effectively to a reader/viewer. Instead of words, a photographer uses visual elements (things included in the image - lines, tones and colours), and instead of grammar, the photographer structures an image by making technical and artistic decisions (about shutter speed, aperture, optics, point of view, perspective, etc.) that place the visual elements appropriately in the frame. The comparison between writing and photography is not new, but duChemin works the analogy extremely well and in a manner that is both inspiring and instructive. In his own words: "I believe that a grasp of what's going on within the frame, and a mindful approach to creating photographs that speak this [visual] language, are enough to create powerful photographs that express or communicate something within us that is bursting to get out".

Another helpful twist on the title *Photographically Speaking* is that it stresses the value of analyzing and *speaking about* photographs in learning to make more successful images ourselves. duChemin uses the second half of the book to guide us in the evaluation of 20 of his own photographs – a broad range of subject matter that includes landscapes, portraits and street scenes – putting his visual design principles into practice. He encourages us to get beyond "I like it" or "I don't like it" and figure out exactly *why*. Then he leads us to apply this analytical technique to *our* photographs, and asks us to extend it so that we make better decisions in the field.

If you're like me, the first thing you will want to do after reading *Photographically Speaking* is go out somewhere with your camera. And if you need an additional incentive to buy the book, it is *Canadian*, as David duChemin (although a self-described "world photographer") hails from Vancouver.
