



Creating Lasting Memories: How to "Photobook"

As an amateur photographer, I have always enjoyed sharing photographic memories with friends and family. When I retired, they inevitably asked me what I planned to do with all my free time. Needless to say, this was not a problem once I embarked on the engaging hobby of designing online photobooks.

The benefit of creating photobooks rather than slide shows is the ease of sharing your photos. Holiday celebrations, travelogues, family fun, portfolios of your work, and weddings are only a few themes you can memorialize. The aim of this article is to encourage photographers unfamiliar with the development process to make a start at creating a book.

"Photobooking" allows the artistic spirit to soar, with personalization a key feature. To stimulate your creativity, some companies even present a selection of books made by other customers for your perusal. Picaboo includes a helpful section of videos and tutorials with great tips and tricks to inspire you and clarify technical issues.

Once you become familiar with an application, it is easy to create a gorgeous, unique photo book. Just remember, though, it does require time and patience. However, many apps allow you to produce quick books with ready-made templates. While this option means you lose the ability to personalize the work, it is a fast smart way of producing your first book.

Before you do anything else, you have to choose, organize, and edit your selection of photos.

Which company?

When choosing an online company, consider the price of the product and shipping, the quality of the output, the variety of design options, and, perhaps most important, the ease of use of the application. Also consider what they offer in the way of:

- types of book, e.g., embossed, image-wrap, softcover
- shapes and sizes, e.g., portrait, landscape, square; selection of sizes (However, be forewarned, once you have committed to a format and size, you may be unable to make changes after commencing the project.)
- background colours or patterns e.g., uniform one throughout prevents too many distractions; different backgrounds to separate sections when you have a variety of themes; photo as the background on certain pages to provide variety and interest
- quality of paper, e.g., archival paper, although costly, will outlive you (This is decided at checkout.)

Other considerations

An abundance of predesigned layouts can facilitate your work. You also have the option of arranging your own picture and text boxes on each page.


For text, you decide the font, size, and colour. From my experience, I'd advise you to use the same font throughout the project unless you have a reason to emphasize a particular text.

Design options can include borders, shadowing, and frames. Many online designers include scrapbook images and lettering. Depending on the subject matter of your book, these tags or pictures can add a whimsical touch.

Recently, I have opted to create "lay flat" books, which are ideal for two-page spreads. I found this makes a real impact.



Two-page spread improved by lay-flat format




And the cost

The cost can vary. You can find excellent deals on either a particular company's internet site or through Groupon offers. When you purchase a coupon through Groupon, you pay for the deal and have a limited time to complete the project. This varies by company, but in my experience, it's usually around 180 days. Coupons are often limited to a specific size, format, and number of pages, but you can pay for additional pages.

Companies also offer specials on their own websites; however, they require you to pay for and submit your work right away. You may also choose to design a book, leave it in your account, and purchase a coupon when it is completed.

Shipping costs are added when you send the work for printing. If a book is produced and shipped from the USA, there may be an additional handling charge when the courier company clears the border. I speak from experience.

Remember, because your book is accessed through your online account, you can acquire additional copies as gifts, but they usually have to be ordered separately which necessitates additional shipping charges. If you haven't purchased an additional discount coupon, you will be charged full price for copy, which can be a hefty expense.

Ask around

Before embarking on the journey, ask other club members for their recommendations. They may suggest which company will meet your specific needs. Over the years, I have used a few different ones, with varying levels of satisfaction. Picaboo and PhotoBook Canada have consistently provided good service and a quality product.

With so many options and considerations, you may find yourself overwhelmed. Nevertheless, why not just start a project? Mistakes can be undone: The backspace key has become my best friend. Share your stories the way you want to. Photobooking can be an extremely pleasurable pastime.

Guest Speaker Presentations

The ECC 2017–2018 season continued with more great presentations. I reconstruct thoughts about three of these from my notes scribbled in the dark.

In November, Yukon-based **Peter Mather** told stories about his "Nature and landscape photography". He specializes in wildlife — talking to the arctic fox while getting nearer to take a close-up; finding luck in connecting with subjects like mountain sheep; losing cameras while photographing bears; capturing on the camera the elusive (and dangerous) wolverine — and had only one "bad" experience. Peter mentioned the difficulties in cold-climate photography, such as short battery life, though even cards frozen in a river can be rescued months later. What's the most important feature of a photograph? Emotion, story, impact. What's not important? Sharpness.
