
### **Homebound Photography**







My Nikon DX5600 and Panasonic Lumix F2.8 25-600 mm cameras have to be ready at all times to capture the light which I see. I joined ECC in 2010, and had my then favorite Minolta film camera with some nice lenses, but the Club was digital so I needed a new camera and it was a thrill to see the images taken immediately. I was conservative, oriented to in-camera composition, and it took some years of learning in the Club to understand image manipulation and to change my attitude. I spent the last few years learning the tools of Lightroom and Photoshop and stopped feeling that I was "cheating". Now I can capture the feeling and emotion behind the image, looking through it to what it can become, a story, making it extra ordinary. Photoshop has helped to expand my expression so I now enjoy focusing on macro, creative, abstract and altered reality images. The possibilities are limited only by my imagination, my feelings, and inspiration. Educated in literature and music, the arts have been a constant part of my life, therefore, there seems to be an unconscious, visible, musical movement in the lines of my creative images, which has been noticed by viewers. My photographs seem to fall into a few categories - dogs, horses, beaches, sunsets and sunrises and family



I'm very interested in some of the learning sessions and presenta-

tions of the club and truly appreciate that activities are still offered via Zoom (in-person meetings are not really feasible for me).



In my teens I had a Pentax K1000 film camera. I had a friend who had a darkroom, and I loved the creative process that film provided me. In 2001 I purchased a Sony F707 Cyber-shot 5 MP digital camera to go on vacation in Europe. Finally, a camera that gave me instant feedback from the LCD screen which allowed me to change my settings on the run. (I occasionally still use it as it has Inferred picture taking!) I joined the Beach Photography Club on my return from vacation and this wonderful experience really increased my enjoyment of photography. I met new like-minded friends, at meeting listened to knowledgeable speakers, entered contests and went on some wonderful outings.

Presently I use the Nikon d500 (cropped sensor) with 70-200mm 2.8 VRII, Nikon 300mm f4 .Both lenses allow me to use the Nikon III 2 x teladapter so I get an effective zoom of 600mm and 900mm great for macro or wildlife photography. I have a Manfrotto Tripod with an ARCA Swiss plate and a Wimberly monopod. I have several other lenses and enjoy many types of photography like ICM, landscape, street photography and portraitures. I use LR, PS, Topaz filters.

#### Harold Ross Presented

#### "Painting with Light"

on Monday, October 24, 2022



Harold spoke about his method of painting the light onto the subject over a long time exposure. For over 15 years, Harold has been concentrating entirely on fine art photography and teaching. He has practiced and perfected his methods using Light Painting for the last three decades, a method that involves "painting" the light onto the subject over a long time- exposure. His work mainly involves still life, but he also makes light-painted photographs of larger subjects, as well as landscapes. For over 30 of those years, he owned a studio producing images for advertising, during which time he practiced and perfected the use of Light Painting as his sole method of lighting. Harold strongly believes in the transformative nature of light, and his goal is to reveal aspects of his subjects that aren't normally apparent under normal lighting conditions.

He has codified his methods into easily understood concepts which he teaches in his workshops. Harold's large-scale color work has been exhibited, collected, and published in the U.S. and internationally.

# Speakers

### The Technical Basics

- Camera on tripod... sturdy is best
- Manual focus, manual exposure, no image stabilization
- Longer lenses are generally best in studio
- Set should be sturdy and stable
- Shoot tethered if you can (Capture One is superior)

### Sturdy Tripod

- · In the studio, heavy is good
- Add weight for more stability
- Ball heads are great for mobility, but pan/tilt heads are better for studio work
- Used studio tripods are cheap

### Camera Settings

- "Bulb" is best (don't use a set time exposure)
- Small F-stop for good depth of field... avoid diffraction
- Use a BASIC shutter release cable
- Shoot RAW only (not RAW+JPEG)

### Lens Choice

- Longer lenses are generally better for still life work
  - Full frame equivalent of 80-120mm is ideal.

#### Shoot tethered if possible; Capture One is the best

- You can see focus and detail much better
- I refer to tethered shooting as
  'Using the World's Best Light Meter'
- Availability of highlight recovery is important while shooting
- Tethered shooting will make you etter technically, especially in the studio
  - Tethering software also functions as RAW processor



#### My thoughts on composition

- Try to avoid compositional flaws:
- Tangent points (things just touching)
  - Avoid having the tallest objects of same height
  - Instead, overlapping helps create depth
- Use leading lines rather than have things parallel to the frame
- Avoid complicated compositions... keep it simple

#### 6 Principles of Lighting

#### #1

The physical size of the light (relative to distance, as we'll see in a moment) directly affects the results:

A larger light is softer (more beautiful) A smaller light is harder (more shape and texture)

#### 6 Principles of Lighting

#### #2

The Inverse Square Law:

The distance of the light to the subject greatly affects the brightness of the light

#### 6 Principles of Lighting

#3

Skimming the light at a very low angle to the surface creates a tremendous amount of texture

#### 6 Principles of Lighting

#5

Exposure time mainly depends on lighting time:

- Mainly: Adjust exposure through light painting time
- Occasionally: Adjust exposure by changing ISO
  - Rarely: Adjust exposure by changing brightness of the light source


