The Wrong Lens. Or Was It?

Imagine walking up Centennial Parkway and witnessing one of nature's events unfold in front of your eyes. While 2 red-tailed hawks battle, a black squirrel ran for it's life and climbed a small

tree. The winning hawk sat on the ground with wings out and eyes fixed on the squirrel. It was only a few seconds before the squirrel was in its grasp, on the ground and hidden from view by the hawk's outstretched wings. Several attempts to fly away with the squirrel failed as its prize was still moving. This sequence took over 2 minutes. I even had a chance to move closer without disturbing the hawk.





There I was with my Lumix 12-35mm lens. Where was the 50-200mm lens with 1.4X teleconverter? Not with me. The pain of it all! Why didn't I bring it? I struggled with my emotions as I berated myself for not bringing the long lens. Not to miss an opportunity I held my breath, prayed I'd prevent camera shake, and tried my best to capture the events as they unfolded.

There is a moral to this story: Sometimes having the privilege to observe nature in action is a gift not to be dismissed. If that is not enough, decide which pain you choose. Carry the heavy gear in case you happen upon such a scene. Live with less than stellar images as a reminder of what you missed and sulk. Remind yourself of the privilege you had in observing nature in action.




Gareth Jones Presented


Saturday October 17th


Sunday October 25th


