

Vin Singh Presented

"Simple and effective workflows for Colour and BW Landscapes"

on Monday, January 29, 2024



Like all forms of Art, Vin believes the most important quality of a photograph is to evoke a strong emotional response. While this sometimes can be achieved being at the right place at the right time, he believes there is more to it than that. Choosing how to interpret and photograph the scene is more important. With the advent of digital photography, we have powerful tools at our disposal but they are at the end just tools. How we visualize the final scene takes place in the mind's eye and understanding how to achieve the desired results are all important steps or details that have to work together to create the final image. His processes involve meticulous attention to detail in his field technique, along with a unique exploratory approach in the digital darkroom.

Being a graduate in the field of Physics, Vin Singh seeks and explores the beauty of the natural world. With courses in photography at University of Waterloo and Ontario College of Arts, Vin began his journey from Science to Photography in 1990, collecting a few awards along the way. Vin's work has been showcased in Nature of Things, Photolife, B+W, Nikon and Silvershotz magazines/calendars and recognized as "World Class Photographer of the 118th Toronto International Salon of Photography.

WHY B&W / WHEN B&W

- B&W (Monochrome used interchangeably) allows a higher level of manipulation in contrast/brightness before image breaks down in realism. Especially true of portraiture or landscape scenes of colour.
- B&W Portraiture is more timeless...less about the makeup/colour of eyes/clothes and more about the mood, subtlety of skin etc. Likewise we can have better leverage over mood in a landscape scene
- B&W good when your digital camera has blown out 2 out of three channels but still has one channel without clipping.
- B&W when the colour in the image does nothing for the image.
- B&W when you have to submit images in B&W competitions.
- Images with prominent shapes/lines, concrete, rock, peeling paint, old wooden anything etc are great b&w studies.
- Sunsets are awful B&W studies (with some exceptions)

UNDERSTANDING FILTERS

- A Red Filter will make red objects appear more white than black. A blue object will appear more black than white. Film days...used for creating dark skies with white clouds.
- Similarly, a Green Filter will make green objects more white than black. Other colours will appear more black than white. Good for flesh tones (as is the yellow filter)
- Blue is not useful for B&W landscape as it will make the sky more white while leaving the land portions near black levels.

EFFECTIVE B&W INTERPRETATION

- Because there is only gradations of a single colour (shade) in monochrome photography, it is essentially all about contrast.
- If there is not enough contrast between various parts of an image, it will look like one big grey mess. This is especially true when printing. (as always there are exceptions with various subject matters)
- Maker has to decide (depending on subject) what colours are to interpreted as white and which colours as black. This is where filters come in.
- B&W images almost always require dodging and burning at some part of the image.

CONVERSION METHODS

- Change mode to greyscale
- De-Saturate
- Channel Mixer
- B&W Filter in Photoshop
- B&W Filter in your RAW processing/Lightroom
- Third party software plug-ins like Silver Effects; DXO; PhotoKit; ON1 etc



CHANNEL MIXER


- Portraits: Change reds to a light shade, increase the Red Channel to something greater than 50, Green Channel to something less than Red and Blue to 0 or less.
- Total % should add up to 100 (if image exposed properly).
- For skin tones, try not to get Red near 100% unless you want that translucent skin effect (IR)
- Landscape with blue sky. Combination similar to above. If there are various shades of vegetation, experiment with the green filter on the strong side.

THE DREADED CURVE

- The easiest and quickest way to a good B&W photo.
- * Allows increase/decrease of local and broad contrast.
- Use the dropper to determine the curve needs to be modified.
- Anything below the diagonal will make that shade darker.
- * Anything above the diagonal will make that shade brighter.
- To change the increase contrast of a selected point apply an 'S' curve centred on the selected area.

DODGING/BURNING

- Fundamental to B&W process
- Do not use burn or dodge tools provided in PS. These are destructive type effects and difficult to work with. They also do not work very well.
- To dodge and burn, create a new layer (some like to set background to gray, opacity to 50%) and mode to 'overlay'
- * Select the brush tool. Start with opacity around 5% (change accordingly)
- * To dodge, select the paint colour as white. Paint the area you wish to dodge.
- To burn, select the paint colour as black.
- * You can also tint by using any colour you like.

"Photography: A Pathway to Creative Life Purpose"


on Monday, February 5, 2024

Kerry Lecky Presented

"Nightscapes Adventures Around the World"

on Monday, February 26, 2024



Kerry-Ann is a senior meteorologist for The Weather Network, a 24hr national TV station in Canada. As much as she enjoys the weather, she has a long-standing love with astronomy and photography that started when she was a kid. After getting her first telescope and SLR film camera in her early teens, she was hooked. In her university years as a Space Science undergraduate, she volunteered at the astronomical observatory where she aided in public tours, observing sessions, and research that included deep sky astrophotography. Over the past few decades, she has honed her skills in post-processing deep sky and Milky Way images under light-polluted skies, forcing her to develop a skill set that helped to create groundbreaking images under those conditions. Her work has ended up winning awards and has been featured countless times in science textbooks, astronomy-related calendars, magazines, and online publications such as Sky & Telescope, Sky News, and NASA APOD. She enjoys sharing her knowledge and experiences by doing speaking engagements and workshops for star parties, astronomy and camera clubs, and the general public.

Her talk included: Brief DSLR/Mirrorless camera setup and how to expose, what it's like to take Milky Way and night sky landscapes in different parts of the world... the stories behind many pictures, some of the challenges and triumphs faced and what was learned, and a few processing tips are highlighted for some of the images.



DSLR/MIRRORLESS CAMERA NIGHTSCAPES BASICS

Calculation to avoid star trailing

- 500 divided by true focal length
- 14mm lens on a full frame camera , 500/14 = 35 seconds
- For a crop camera multiply focal length by 1.6
- For greater accuracy use the NPF rule





Jesse & Susan Villemaire Presented


"Persistence (Wildlife from Algonquin)"













